- 1. Call to Order:** Dawn Dyer, Board Chair, called the meeting to order at **3:32pm**.

- 2. Board Comments:** Kevin Clerici and Dawn Dyer thanked and all volunteers and CoC Staff that participated in this year's Point in Time Count (PITC).
- 3. CoC Staff Comments:** Jenn Harkey thanked all community agencies and partners that participated in this year's PITC. Thanks to an all-call close to the date of the PITC, the number of volunteers increased from about 200 to close to 400.
- 4. Public Comments:** There were no comments

- 5. Approval of Board Minutes from January 11, 2022**
Kevin Clerici moved approval; Manuel Minjares seconded. All in favor.
- 6. Receive an update on the County Board of Supervisors' approval for consultant services from LeSar Development Consultants to update the Ventura County Plan to Prevent and End Homelessness and generate actionable recommendations.**
Jenn shared that County Board of Supervisors did approve consultant services from LeSar Development Consultants. Through HMIS and GES system, engaging with people with lived experience, and stakeholder/community feedback, we'll bring quantitative and qualitative analysis to develop recommendations for the collaborating communities; Christy Madden shared that this is in partnership with Thousand Oaks, Ventura, and Oxnard.

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7. Review and approve the Ventura County Continuum of Care's intent to apply for the State's Encampment Resolution Funding Program in coordination with local jurisdictions.

Jenn shared that the CoC was moving forward with applying for the State's Encampment Resolution Funding (ERF) Program with the cities of Thousand Oaks, Santa Paula and Oxnard applying. Documentation needed to apply has been gathered from the city partners. Thousand Oaks is applying for ERF to develop a Navigation Center. Thousand Oaks pathway to housing is the Homekey project converting a motel property into PSH. The Santa Paula encampment is found in the watershed and ERF will support interim sheltering by developing a new project with Dignity Moves and Hope with a Mission. Santa Paula's pathway to housing includes dedicated housing vouchers from the Santa Paula Housing Authority. Oxnard, which has the largest homeless population, is focusing on Street Outreach and interim sheltering through motel vouchers. Oxnard's pathway to housing includes several upcoming PSH projects which have been funded through other sources, including Casa de Carmen and Central Terrace. A letter of support has been requested from a partner motel demonstrating there is available space for voucher-holders. VC CoC staff are providing the administrative support to complete the ERF applications and submit by February 28, 2023.

Manuel Minjares shared that he was aware of the Santa Paula proposal and was excited for the possibilities. Jack Edelstein noted that the property in mind is across the street from SPIRIT and would create a hub/center for assistance. Dawn acknowledged CoC staff's efforts for the hard work being undertaken in preparation to apply. Elizabeth R. Stone asked how much funding is allocated for each project and Jenn replied that budget submittals from partners is pending. Dawn asked about funding for Homekey 3.0. Jenn replied that the County will be applying and supporting the applications for projects later this Spring. Thousand Oaks and Oxnard have been awarded HomeKey funds for motel conversion projects in the last round. Dawn asked about the City of Ventura and Jenn shared that they were interested in applying for the next (application) window.

Kevin Clerici moved approval; Paul Drevenstedt seconded. All in favor.

8. Receive an update from the workgroup engaging people with lived expertise.

Elizabeth R. Stone from A Friend In Deed (FIND), presented on the work she is doing in the community in working with Persons with Lived Experience (PLE). The program provides unconditional support and Elizabeth is actively seeking input from different perspectives to make a positive impact on our homelessness system and educate the community. FIND is in partnership with the National Health Foundation (NHF) and receives CoC grant funding through NHF as the fiscal agent.

Elizabeth invited 3 of the persons she is working to share their testimonies: Christopher, Staci and Doug. Elizabeth provided additional program details and invited attendees to visit their location.

Dawn, Manuel and Dr. Sevet Johnson shared heartfelt thanks to the speakers for opening up and sharing their powerful stories. Dawn closed by commenting on the difficulties of affording a place to live. She further shared that \$2,450.00 apartment rent today, \$1,467.00 10 years ago.

Elizabeth wanted to highlight that car windows destruction has been on the rise recently.

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9. Receive and file VC CoC Committee, Workgroups and Staff updates.

HMIS Steering Committee: Jenn shared that a new project, under the Human Services Agency, will implement new online training modules. A new addition to HMIS is Gold Coast Health Plan's CalAIM Care Management Team. This is helpful for cross system collaboration.

Data, Performance & Evaluation Committee: Jenn shared that this committee focused on grant proposals scoring and ranking reviews for the past 3 years, but has shifted to reviewing system performance and quarterly updates on a regular cycle to bring recommendations to the CoC Board and allow for feedback.

Public Information and Outreach Committee: Felipe shared that monthly meetings have been changed to quarterly meetings to develop outreach projects. He is also actively recruiting for more members to join the committee. Suggested outreach campaigns include Special Roundtable Session with Persons with Lived Expertise (PLE), Film Screening and Discussion (topic: homelessness in the county or Southern California), and greater presence on social media apps.

Jenn shared that the CSUCI Student Group (Communications Studies) are willing to lend their support to share stories and work with community partners. This has expanded social media presence for VC CoC on Instagram and Facebook for public awareness.

She shared that we are actively engaged with Veterans Case Conference Workgroup and Youth Collaborative Workgroup (over 20 youth providers) in pursuit to end veteran homelessness and end youth homelessness. VC CoC staff manage a by-name list of homeless veterans in our community to coordinate with the Veteran Affairs Supportive Housing team and local homeless service providers. Jenn also shared that our homeless youth subpopulation is more difficult to survey during the Homeless PITC. Youth service providers stepped in to help with surveys and get them counted.

SUBJECT: Receive the Ventura County 2023 Homeless Count preliminary data report and authorize staff to submit the final Point in Time Count and Housing Inventory Count reports to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) no later than April 30, 2023.

Background: The Ventura County Continuum of Care (VC CoC) staff, city leads and community volunteers conduct the annual Homeless Point In Time Count and Subpopulation Survey of homeless persons during the last ten days of January, as required by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for Continuum of Care funding. This one-night survey of sheltered persons/families and one day count and survey of unsheltered persons/families results in a snapshot of one day of homelessness across the region. The reports help to inform the VC CoC Board as well as other stakeholders in the community on the need for resources within the community as well as trends in the populations experiencing homelessness.

Discussion: The 2023 sheltered count was conducted on the night of January 23rd and the unsheltered surveys began on the early morning of January 24th. All persons surveyed were asked where they slept on the night of January 23, 2023. Surveys were conducted at service sites and encampment locations during the week following the night of the count, as allowed by HUD. Mobile application surveys were conducted with GIS mapping technology throughout the County. The final written report is being developed in partnership with Dr. Joe Colletti at Urban Initiatives and will include subpopulation data and detailed information for each jurisdiction. The report will be released to the public no later than April 10, 2023. A presentation will be provided at the VC CoC Board meeting on April 12, 2023.

Recommendations: Authorize staff to submit the final Homeless Point In Time Count and Housing Inventory Count reports to HUD no later than April 30, 2023.

SUBJECT: Approval of recommendations for State of California Homeless Housing & Assistance Program (HHAP) Round 4 grant funding as developed by the VC CoC Data, Performance & Evaluation Committee.

BACKGROUND: The Ventura County Continuum of Care (VC CoC) Board approved the adopted HHAP grant priorities on December 9, 2021 and re-reviewed for adoption on October 12, 2022 for HHAP Round 4. VC CoC staff released the HHAP-4 Requests for Proposals on January 11, 2023, with applications due on February 9, 2023. VC CoC staff applied to the California Interagency Council on Homelessness for the combined CoC and County allocation of \$5,791,833.57 by the deadline of November 28, 2022. Applications are currently under review with the State with an anticipated award announcement at the end of April 2023.

In response to the RFP, proposals for HHAP Round 4 funds were received in all funding categories except for Shelter Improvements and CES system supports. There was a total of 20 applications submitted with a total funding request in the amount of \$12,057,296.00. A total of 18 applications met eligibility and were included in the rank and review process. VC CoC staff used a standard scoring criterion when reviewing the HHAP-4 proposals which includes the following categories: 1) applicant capacity, 2) project design and approach, 3) financial capacity, feasibility, sustainability, 4) past performance, 5) coordination and collaboration, and 6) funding priority. The VC CoC Data Committee reviewed the staff analysis of the proposals received and made funding recommendations based on the ranking of the top six VC CoC priorities, which includes Delivery of Permanent Housing, Operational Subsidies, Prevention & Shelter Division, Rapid Rehousing, Interim Sheltering and Services Coordination.

HHAP Round 4 includes new statute with a requirement for all sub-recipients to draw down 50% of their allocation by May 31, 2025. This drawdown requirement will allow Ventura County to receive the remainder disbursement. With this requirement, there were three applications with anticipated start dates that would not meet this requirement. The committee is recommending these three applications for Delivery of Permanent Housing from Step Up, People's Self Help Housing and Housing Authority of San Buena Ventura to be included in the HHAP Round 5 application process and be considered for rank and review using their HHAP 4 Request for Proposals Application.

The chart below shows the proposals recommended for funding. Several proposals were not considered for funding for various reasons, including low priority, incomplete applications, and ineligible activity types.

SUBJECT: Receive and file the submittal of FY22 (October 1, 2021 - September 30, 2022) System Performance Measures Report to the U.S. Department of Housing & Urban Development.

BACKGROUND: Continuums of Care across the country are responsible for submitting the System Performance report annually to HUD. The System Performance Measures report includes all projects which collect data in the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) including Continuum of Care (CoC) and Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) funded programs. Programs that receive State or local funding are also included in the overall system performance evaluation.

DISCUSSION: The System Performance metrics include the following measures:

1. **Length of time persons remain homeless** (ES, SH and TH programs)
2. **Returns to homelessness** (exits from permanent housing destinations within 2 years);
3. **Total number of homeless persons** (Point in Time Count compared to annual counts of persons utilizing shelter and transitional housing programs);
4. **Employment and Income Growth** for homeless persons in CoC funded programs;
5. **Number of persons who become homeless for the first time;**
6. **Housing Placements** from Street Outreach and other programs;
7. **HMIS Data Quality**

System Performance is a key portion of the annual HUD CoC competition. It is the area where the Ventura County CoC has lost the greatest number of points. While Ventura County CoC has gained participation across the service system of new programs and providers that have not traditionally participated in HMIS and coordinated entry, the system has struggled to improve the overall system performance. Evaluating system performance regularly through the VC CoC Data, Performance & Evaluation Committee will be key to determining if those resources have positive outcomes and help guide future funding recommendations and VC CoC Board priorities.

The attached report is the full report submitted to HUD on February 28, 2023.

This measure includes data from each client's "Length of Time on Street, in an Emergency Shelter, or Safe Haven" (Data Standards element 3.17) response and prepends this answer to the client's entry date effectively extending the client's entry date backward in time. This "adjusted entry date" is then used in the calculations just as if it were the client's actual entry date.

NOTE: Due to the data collection period for this year's submission, the calculations for this metric are based on the data element 3.17 that was active in HMIS from 10/1/2015 to 9/30/2016. This measure and the calculation in the SPM specifications will be updated to reflect data element 3.917 in time for next year's submission.
